CEO UPDATE

We acknowledge the Country that we work and live on is and has always been Wathaurong Country. Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative (Wathaurong) provides supports to our Community living on Wathaurong, Gulidian and Gadabanud country. We pay our respects to Elders past, present and to all Aboriginal people on Country who have contributed to the diverse Aboriginal Cultural Society we have today.

There has been a lot of exciting things happening over the past few months, including a huge range of activities and celebrations for NAIDOC Week. It is great to see our celebrations get bigger and better every year, and see more and more people involved. I would like to thank and acknowledge the staff at VIVA Energy, who volunteered for our Flag Raising event to take on the roles that would normally be done by our Wathaurong Community members, allowing them to relax and participate in the event instead.

We have also recently started our Community Possum Skin Cloak project with Aunty Lisa Couzens, with several workshops already taking place to start the process of making a total of 10 cloaks. 6 of these cloaks were designated for Board Members and



the CEO, and it was very special during our NAIDOC Flag Raising event to be able to smoke these cloaks and present them to the Board. These cloaks will be passed on from Board member to Board member, as new members are elected, creating a tradition that is linked to our culture.

2 of the remaining possum cloaks that are being created will be designated as "Community Cloaks" – the intention is that these will be able to be borrowed by Community members to use for special occasions, such as weddings, graduations or other significant events.

WESTERN DISTRICT ACCO COLLECTIVE (WDAC)

Another exciting development is the aunch of the Western District ACCO Collective, or WDAC – which is the coming together of the 8 ACCOs in the west to advocate for the self-determination of our rural and regional western Victoria communities.

The WDAC membership includes Ballarat and District Aboriginal Co-operative, Budja Budja Aboriginal Co-opeerative,

HEALTH SERVICES

WATHAURONG HEALTH SERVICES ACHIEVES AGPAL ACCREDITATION

Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative increased its community health credentials earlier this year when our health service received a national award of accreditation, demonstrating its commitment to quality and safety within its practice.

Wathaurong received this important recognition from Australian General Practice Accreditation Limited (AGPAL), the leading not-for-profit provider of general practice accreditation services within Australia.

AGPAL Chair, Dr Richard Choong, said accreditation shows that the practice makes a significant investment and commitment to quality on a day-to-day basis, across all levels of the practice team.

"Achieving accreditation is a major achievement for any practice and a clear demonstration that Wathaurong is striving to improve their level of care to both patients and the community," he said.

"Practices seek accreditation because they want to do their best and view this as another step towards excellence in patient care."

To achieve accreditation, a practice team works over a 12-month period to implement the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) Standards for general practices. The RACGP Standards provide a recognised national benchmark for general practices and services, and a template for quality care and risk management.


Areas of focus during an on-site assessment for accreditation include: ensuring vaccines are within their use-by-date and stored at the correct temperatures, that the practice's equipment is clean and sterile, practice staff are up-to-date with their training, and the practice has emergency care available.

Dr Choong said accreditation is attainable only through cooperation and communication between staff members.

"Everyone at the practice plays a valuable role in working to meet the RACGP Standards. It gives staff a real sense of pride to work in an AGPAL accredited practice," added Dr Choong.




WATHAURONG WAY

More updates will be provided as works are completed, we are hopeful of a completion date in late 2023!















WATHAURONG ABORIGINAL CO-OPERATIVE SUPPORTS FIRST NATIONS VOICE TO PARLIAMENT

We would like to first acknowledge the Traditional Owners of this land, the Wadda Wurrung people of the Kulin Nation, and pay respect to Elders past, present and emerging and their continuing connection to land, water, Spirit, and Country.

The Voice to Parliament Referendum came from the Uluru Statement from the Heart, which was an invitation to the Australian People. It was an invitation to walk with First Nations in a movement for a better future for all Australians.

Towards the end of this year, all Australians will have their say by voting in a referendum to recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the First Peoples of Australia through an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice enshrined in our Constitution. All Australians have the right to vote on this matter in the referendum. We encourage everyone in the Community to be informed to make their own choice, and to have respect for different viewpoints and opinions from their own.

Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative has spent time considering all the information available, held numerous Community consultations, and conducted a survey to gain an understanding of what Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Community members think about the Voice to Parliament. Through all our consultations, we have found that many of our Community members are in favour of the Voice to Parliament.

On behalf of the organisation and based on the feedback we have received from our Community, the Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative Board support the YES position in the Voice to Parliament Referendum. The Board believe that the Voice to Parliament will give Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders Communities a say in the laws and policies that affect us in our daily lives.

The Voice to Parliament enshrined in the Australian Constitution is not the end point for us – it is another step in the long journey that First Nations peoples have taken to be acknowledged, counted, and heard.

The referendum that was held in 1967 saw more than 90% of the population vote "Yes" to having Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander people counted as part of the Australian population.

In 1967, we were counted. In 2023, we want our Voice to be heard.

It is with great excitement that we launch Western District ACCO Collective (WDAC). WDAC formalises the long-standing solidarity and partnership of our Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations (ACCOs), coming together to advocate for the self-determination of our rural and regional western Victoria Communities.

Our membership includes Ballarat and District Aboriginal Co-operative, Budja Budja Aboriginal Co-operative, Dhauwurd Wurrung Elderly & Community Health Service, Goolum Goolum Aboriginal Co-operative, Gunditjmara Aboriginal Co-operative, Kirrae Health Service, Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative, and Winda-Mara Aboriginal Co-operative. WDAC represents the largest regional Victorian Aboriginal population of 28% of Victoria's Aboriginal people, who live on 38% of Victoria's beautiful Country.

ACCOs are critical for Community and cultural strengthening. Our ACCOs all run specialist wraparound health and wellbeing support services for our families and Communities from pregnancy through to the Dreaming. Our services are run by Community, for Community. Our services include cultural and Community engagement, primary and allied health, social and emotional wellbeing and recovery, maternity services, early childhood, youth programs, family services, homelessness and housing, NDIS, and aged care services.

WDAC will be accountable to the self-determined needs and aspirations of our Western Districts' families, Communities and ACCOs, with the backing of and funding from our government and regional partners. WDAC will:

- Be a powerful voice advocating at regional, state and national forums for our families, Communities and ACCOs.
- Use Aboriginal ways of knowing, being and doing to lead, design and facilitate the solutions to achieve equity and beyond for our Communities.
- Hold government and partners to account at local and regional levels, to ensure that all Aboriginal funding is self determined and led by Aboriginal families, Communities and ACCOs.
- Support whole of Community approaches to address the ongoing harm of systemic racism that disproportionately impacts Aboriginal Communities.
- Achieve ongoing, equitable and significant funding for our ACCO's infrastructure, workforce, Community strengthening, and services that we deliver 'our way'.



SAVING THE PLAINS-WANDERER FROM EXTINCTION

Wathaurong has teamed up with Werribee Zoo to help save the critically endangered Plains-wanderer (Pedionomus torquatus), a small ground-dwelling bird that was once common in southwest Victoria. Genetically, it is one of the most important birds in the world, with its ancestry likely dating back 60 million years to when Australia was joined to South America via the Antarctic land bridge. Unfortunately, despite surviving for that phenomenal time, just 200 years of European agricultural expansion, grazing, and urbanisation have devastated its habitat, leaving only about 500 remaining in the wild.

Werribee Zoo's critical repopulation efforts have involved releasing eight Plains-wanderers from their controlled breeding program to an undisclosed natural habitat in northern Victoria. Now, together with Wathaurong staff, the Zoo has strategically and discreetly positioned song meters at Wurdi Youang, our conservation restoration property in Little River, to record the acoustic landscape and potentially identify the Plains-wanderer's call. This proud collaboration aims to secure the future of this ancient and incredible bird.

MEET THE PLAINS-WANDERER

Ideal habitat

The Plains-Wanderer's preferred habitat is native grasslands and open plains with low vegetation, providing easy foraging and hiding places from predators. These specific conditions have earned it the affectionate nickname "Goldilocks", as it thrives in habitats that are not too dense or too sparse, but are "just right". They forage for seeds and insects, and surprisingly can co-exist with light livestock grazing because this keeps the grasses and plants from becoming too dense.

Female Plains-wanderers



Noticeably larger and more vibrant than males, the female Plains-wanderer boasts chestnut-brown plumage with intricate black and white markings, aiding her camouflage in the grassy environment. Unconventionally, she may mate with more than one male during mating season,

leaving males to incubate and care for eggs and chicks while she seeks other mates.

Lifecycle

Plains-wanderers may breed several times in a season and lay 1 to 5 eggs per clutch. They hatch within 23 days, reach independence within 2 months, and live up to 2 to 3 years, though survival in the wild depends on factors like habitat quality, food availability, and threats from predators such as eagles, hawks,

owls, foxes and feral cats, especially during nesting and chick rearing

Male Plains-wanderers



Smaller and less vibrant than his female counterpart, the male Plains-wanderer's sandy browns, greys, and whites blend

seamlessly into the environment. Like females, he has long legs that help him effectively navigate open plains. During breeding season, he plays a paramount role in parental duties by incubating eggs and caring for young chicks, teaching them survival skills for their nomadic lifestyle.

CHILD SAFE POLICY

Over the past eight years there have been a number of enquiries into the historical abuse of children whilst in the care of institutions. What these enquiries found was that the abuse of children was widespread throughout different types of institutions and all across the country. This abuse was particularly the case for vulnerable children, including Aboriginal children - who may have been separated from family and kin.

In order to stop abuse occurring, it is now an obligation for most agency's across Victoria to become Child SAFE, including Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative. This means having a more diligent approach in recruitment and management practices, reporting and investigating incidences of child abuse perpetrated by the agency's staff or volunteers, listening to clients and community more if they have a concern about their safety when receiving a service, and having a strong culture of zero tolerance of abuse of children and young people. Each and every Wathaurong staff member or volunteer, including Foster Carers, is expected to manage themselves in a way that is consistent with keeping children safe from harm. See below Wathaurong's formal Statement of Commitment and how community members or clients can express concerns for children's safety.

Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative is committed to providing a safe and friendly environment for children and young people, and Wathaurong has zero tolerance for any form of abuse of children and young people, including sexual abuse, physical abuse, emotional abuse, cultural abuse, and neglect.

Wathaurong is committed to ensuring all children engaged with its services are culturally safe, including children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds and children with disabilities. Wathaurong believes in the right of a child to safety in their physical and online environments.

Wathaurong Aboriginal Co-operative understands its obligations under the Commission for Children and Young People's Child Safe and Reportable Conduct schemes, as well as Victorian laws such as the Failure to Disclose offence and mandatory reporting obligations under the Children Youth and Families Act. Wathaurong will uphold these obligations in the best interest of Aboriginal children.

Wathaurong will make sure we include children and families in the decisions that affect them, and we understand how children's active participation in their care arrangements helps to prevent abuse – we will listen to children and young people and take their concerns seriously.
